

- SSIS Charting and Analysis and other reports (available to agency personnel)



Points to Remember

- Look at definitions on second page of toolkit, especially:
 - Disposition
 - Age of pending
- Entering a disposition terminates a reported placement in MNCIS – affects age of pending and pending list



Look at your county data

- Is it correct?
- What does it suggest?
- What can the CJI team do about it?
 - Develop hypothesis
 - Test hypothesis with more data
 - PDSA (plan, do, study, act)
 - Regenerate data
 - Acknowledge efforts, celebrate improvements

- Identifying and engaging nonresident parents (fathers)
- Identifying maternal and paternal relatives
- Developing case plans and judicial monitoring during review hearings
- Ongoing permanency planning for older youth
- Content of petitions child and foster parent address
- Notice when child returns home or moves in foster care
 - CJI Team composition and meeting frequency

22	The case plan: Iists the specific reasons why the child was placed in foster care, and when reunification is the plan, a description of the problems or conditions in the home of the parent or parents which necessitated removal of the child from home. Minn. Stat. § 260C.212, subd. 1(c)
23	The case plan: specifies the actions to be taken by the child's parent or parents to eliminate or correct the problems or conditions causing the child's removal from home: the specific behavioral changes that must be demonstrated and sustained by the parent before the child may be returned home; and the time period during which the actions are to be taken. Minn. Stat. § 260C.212, subd. 1(c)
24	The case plan includes: a description of any services or resources that were requested by the child or the child's parent, guardian, foster parent, or custodian since the date of the child's placement in the residential facility, and whether those services or resources were provided and, if not, the basis for
