Sounds like they're kind of in charge of 10 Q the milking, those two older girls; do you have 11 something that's mostly yours? 12 We babysit. 13 A You're babysitting the littler ones? 14 0 Yes. 15 A All right. What do you like to do if you get 16 0 some spare time? 17 I like to play ball. 18 A Baseball? 19 0 Yeah. 20 A Okay. Do you play in, like, bi-county league 21 22 or --23 A No, we play --Just play yourselves? 24 Q 25 My brothers and sisters play. A

Do you have a place on the farm where there's --1 0 Behind the house. 2 A Okay. There's a big open area? 3 0 A Yeah. 4 All right. How often would you say you do that 5 0 in the summertime? Not much in the wintertime, 7 I know. Whenever we can. A Any time you can. Sometimes every day? 9 0 No, not all the time. 10 A Not that much. How about in the wintertime, 11 0 what do you like to do? Do you like to go 12 13 outside in the winter, or do you like inside activities? 14 I like outside stuff. 15 A Outside. What stuff? 16 0 I like pushing snow and sledding. 17 A 18 Do you like shoveling snow? 0 19 Yeah. A Really. There could be some use for you in some 20 0 21 households. I've known some 13-year-olds that 22 weren't so fond of that. At least two of them I can think of. 23

Tell me about your religious upbringing and your family's churches or church.

- 1 A What do you mean?
- 2 Q Tell me where you go to church and --
- 3 A We go to church in Mankato.
- Q Where is that at? Do you know the name of the church?
- 6 A No.
- 7 O Okay. Do you know what -- is it a Lutheran?
- 8 A No, it's a Catholic.
- 9 Q Catholic church. Okay. Is it a big church or little church?
- 11 A It's a littler church.
- 12 O Okay. Is there an actual church building?
- 13 A Yes.
- Q Who is your priest or pastor, whatever it is?
- (Daniel looks at his mother.)
- 16 BY THE COURT:
- 17 Q That's okay if -- Daniel, if you don't know,

  18 that's okay. "I don't know" is a perfectly good

  19 answer, okay? What I want to do is I want to

  20 talk to you instead of anybody else, okay? If

  21 you don't know, that's fine.

- Q Okay. Do you guys go -- it's quite a ways away.

Does your family 6 0 have other religious practices that they do on a daily basis or on those Sundays when you don't go to church? 10 We pray the rosary on the Sundays we don't go. A Is that an organized family activity? 11 0 12 A Yes. 13 0 So everybody gets together and does it? 14 A Yes. 15 Okay. How about on any other days? I don't 0 want to presume that you only --16 We say one rosary every day. 17 A Is that at a certain time of the day or --18 0 Whenever we get time. It's usually at night. 19 A Usually at night. Do you do it as a group 20 0 21 activity? 22 A Yes. So those who are old enough can say it, get 23 0 together and do it? 24 Yes. 25 A

Your mom told me yesterday that she's done some 0 1 natural healing methods or some other ways of 2 thinking of healing than maybe some people do, 3 you know what I'm talking about? A Yes. 5 Okay. Were you raised that way? 6 0 A Yes. Tell me what that means to you. What happened 8 0 and when? 9 10 What do you mean? A Well, when you got a sore throat when you were a 11 0 kid, what did your mom and dad do? 12 She always rubbed some stuff on the chest. 13 A Okay. Do you know what the stuff was? 14 0 I don't remember, no. 15 A Did it work? 16 0 17 A Yeah. Okay. She put it on the outside of your chest? 18 0 Yeah. 19 A Like here? 20 0 21 If you had an earache? She used ear candle. 22 A Ear candle. I've heard of it, but I don't think 23 0 24 I've ever seen it done. Tell me what happens. 25 A It pulls the wax out of your ear.

- 1 Q How does it do that?
- 2 A You light it on the end.
- 3 Q Do you lay down, I presume?
- 4 A Yeah.
- 5 Q Okay. And then what?
- A Then you light it, and then you put it in your ear and you suck it out.
- Q Okay. Do you do it in both ears or just the one that hurts?
- 10 A Just the one that hurts.
- 11 Q Okay. Did that seem to work?
- 12 A Yeah.
- Q Okay. Did you ever have big cuts, you know,
- like I had and my kids had cuts where you had to
- put stitches in them?
- 16 A No, I didn't.
- 17 Q Did you ever have that?
- 18 A No.
- 19 Q Never did. Did you ever have any big cuts that
- 20 bled for a long time?
- 21 A No.
- Q Okay. So that hasn't happened.
- Did you ever break a bone?
- 24 A Not yet.
- Q Never have, huh? Good for you.

Did you have the measles or the chicken 1 pox when you were younger? 2 A I think I did. 3 Okay. Do you remember what, what was done, if 0 anything? 5 I don't really remember. 6 A Not remember. You were maybe pretty young? 7 0 A Yeah. 8 Just not sure. How about the other kids in the 0 family, have any of them had broken bones? 10 11 A No. Never. Wow. Have any of them had, like, 12 0 injuries where they've -- you know, I remember 13 once my brother and I were horsing around and we 14 bonked his head on the desk. Nobody was doing 15 anything to try and hurt the other one, but he 16 got a really big cut in the forehead and he was 17 bleeding like crazy. Anything like that ever 18 happen with your brothers and sisters? 19 No. 20 A Nobody ever got something where they had a real 21 0 serious cut? 22 (Moves head side to side.) 23 A No? 24 0

When did you first hear about, and I'm

not, perhaps, going to pronounce the name correctly, but I'll try, Nemenhah? 2 Nemenhah. 3 A Nemenhah. When did you first hear about that? 0 5 A About a year and a half ago. How did you hear about that? 6 0 Through my mom's friends. 7 A Okay. Do you know who those friends are? 0 9 A Yeah. 10 0 By name? I don't know their names, but I know one. 11 A 12 So if they came in, you'd recognize them as your 0 mom's friends? 13 14 There's only one here, I think. A Is it someone who lives around here? 15 0 16 Yeah. A 17 0 Do you know that person's name? 18 A Jean. 19 Jean? 0 20 A Jean Ringer. 21 Jean Ringer? Q (Moves head up and down.) 22 A 23 Is she, like, a close friend of your family? Yeah. She drives for us to the cities and 24 A stuff. 25

I see. Okay. And then they sent you home 1 0 without giving you any chemotherapy? 2 Right. 3 A All right. And told you to come back? 0 Well, I had to come back because I couldn't 5 A breathe anymore. 6 Okay. When you went back home at the end of 7 0 those three days, how were you feeling? 8 I was feeling okay. 9 A Were you feeling better or worse than when you 10 0 arrived or the same? 11 I was about the same, but --12 A Still having a hard time breathing? 13 0 14 A Yeah. Okay. Did they tell you -- did the doctors 15 0 there tell you to do anything when you went back 16 home as far as taking medicine or doing anything 17 else? 18 19 No. A How, how long did you stay at home, then, before 20 0 you went back? 21 About a week. 22 A 23 0 Okay. That's when the doctors started the chemotherapy? 24 When I -- when they put the port in, that's when 25 A

- 1 they started.
- 2 Q The next time you went back, the second time?
- 3 A Right.
- 4 Q Tell me about this port thing.
- 5 A It hurts.
- 6 Q Okay. What is it? I've never had one.
- 7 A It's a round circle right here.

paper. I'll just hand it to you. There's

numbers 1 through 12 there. Did you write those 1 12 things down and then someone copied them onto 2 3 the paper? No. I signed it. 4 A 5 0 Okay. Had you ever seen those 1 through 12 6 things before you signed it? 7 A No. Yeah, when I signed it, it was on there. Had you seen them before that day? 8 0 Yeah. 9 A 10 0 You had? 11 A Yeah. 12 When? 0 13 A Before I signed it. Uh-huh. 14 0 15 A When I signed it, all this was on here already. Okay. Had you seen -- that was -- I think that 16 0 17 was my fault. I think that was a bad question I 18 just asked. It was not a very easy question to 19 answer. The things that that says, that that 20 21 paper says, had you talked about those with anyone on a day prior to the day that you signed 22 23 it, earlier day? 24 A No.

Had you written those things down earlier?

I think, yeah. 1 A Okay. Can you just -- tell you what, Danny, can 2 0 3 you just read -- forget the part that I read because I think that's lawyer talk, but start 4 with Number 1. Can you just read that for me. 5 MRS. HAUSER: Your Honor, I'm sorry, I do 6 7 have to cut in. Danny is in the process of -well, I'd rather not have him hear this. Could 8 he step out for a minute? 9 THE COURT: Sure, absolutely. Mr. 10 Elbert, any objection? I think his mother wants 11 12 to talk to everybody. MRS. HAUSER: I want everybody except 13 14 Danny. THE COURT: Do you have any objection? 15 MR. ELBERT: No objection. 16 17 THE COURT: Danny, it sounds like your 18 mom wants to talk to me without you being 19 present, and that's fine with me, as long as 20 your attorney says it's okay, and he says it's 21 okay. Why don't you go with Mr. Elbert. Why 22 don't you stand out in the hall there. I think 23 it is just going to take a few seconds. 24 MRS. HAUSER: Right.

(WHEREUPON, Daniel Hauser leaves the

MR. OLSON: No problem. 1 THE COURT: All right. So beginning now, 2 this won't be part of the transcript that's 3 filed because it relates to some other issues. THE COURT: The cause of his reading 9 difficulties or his learning difficulties is 10 really no one's business but yours for present 11 12 purposes. Here's my question of you, Mr. and Mrs. 13 14 Hauser--and I certainly don't want to embarrass Daniel or make this more difficult for him in 15 any way, I feel very badly for that young 16 17 man--you're telling me he won't be able to read that --18 MRS. HAUSER: Yeah. 19 20 THE COURT: He's not going to be able to read it? 21 MRS. HAUSER: Bits and pieces, but you'll 22 23 make him cry. THE COURT: I don't want to do that. 24 25 MRS. HAUSER: They put him in fifth

grade, but he's tutored, you see what I mean? 1 THE COURT: So what --MRS. HAUSER: He's tutored. 3 THE COURT: What you're telling me, and I 4 appreciate your doing this, you're saying that 5 Daniel is not going to be able to read this 6 affidavit? 7 MRS. HAUSER: No, but what he said, this 8 is what he told us. 9 THE COURT: Okay. 10 MRS. HAUSER: He said -- I can't use his 11 exact words, it would not be appropriate, but 12 he, he just -- he won't. 13 THE COURT: I think you've given the 14 answer to how we go about this. I'm going to 15 have him tell me in his own words what this says 16 17 without reading it. MRS. HAUSER: Like Danny -- I'm sorry, go 18 ahead. 19 THE COURT: Just a minute, let her 20 21 finish. MRS. HAUSER: Like Danny, you noticed 22 he's forgetful, you know, he's -- I mean --23 THE COURT: I haven't noticed that, 24 actually, during our conversation here. 25

Actually, I haven't noticed that. He seems like a very nice young man, and I would say his recollection of things that happened several months ago is, to my observation, at least, average for a 13-year-old. I mean, when my kids were that age, they couldn't remember to bring their homework home from school. You know, 13-year-old minds are not quite the same as 52-year-old minds or any of our ages. I think he's at least average in his ability to recall the things we're talking about.
