Preserving Family Connections



When to Consider Relative Placement

- Every time a child enters foster care.
- Every time the agency considers moving the child to a different placement location.
- When reunification is no longer a consideration and an alternative permanency plan is developed.
- Every annual permanency hearing for a child ordered into long-term foster care.

Agency Responsibilities Relative Search

- Conducting relative/kinship searches
- Notifying relatives/kin
- Documenting agency efforts
- Working with tribal social services
- Informing the court

Relative Search General Requirements

- Responsible social services agency must consider placement with a relative without delay
- Responsible social services shall identify relatives and notify them of the need for out-of-home placement – temporary and/or permanent

[Minnesota Statutes, section 260C.212, subdivision 5 (a)]

Relative Search General Requirements (con't)

- Relative search shall be reasonable and comprehensive in scope
- The search may last up to six months or until a fit and willing relative is identified
- Relative search shall include both maternal and paternal relatives of the child, if paternity is adjudicated

[Minnesota Statutes, section 260C.212, subdivision 5 (a)]

Benefits of Relative/ Kinship Care

Family Preservation

 Family system maintains the role of primary care provider for the child

Reduces the child's loss and trauma

Use of Relative Care AFCARS Data (3 year average)

• Minnesota: 17 percent

National: 23 percent

Benefits of Relative Foster Care

What is known from the research?

Safety

 Children in relative foster care tend to be just as safe as, or safer than, children placed with unrelated foster families.

Stability

 Relative foster placements tend to be more stable than placements with unrelated foster families.

Sibling Connections

 Children in relative foster care are more likely to maintain sibling connections.

Community Connections

 Children in relative foster care are more likely to maintain community connections.

Permanence

 Children placed with relatives are more likely to achieve permanency than if not placed with relatives.
