

Number of new filings for Major cases since 1999




New Filings for Major Civil Case Types

Major Civil case types are those cases that require a Judge and are blocked to a specific judge after filing. These cases are some of the District's most complex case types. Under the category of Personal Injury there are three case types: personal injury, malpractice, and wrongful death. Other Civil includes: Conciliation Appeal, Condemnation, Eminent Domain, Employment, Torrens, etc.) There has been a 1.7% decrease in Major Civil Cases.

Towards the end of 2003, the legislature increased in the filing fee for new Civil cases and there has been a corresponding decrease in new cases filed.

New Filings for Minor Civil Case Types

Minor Civil case types are those that do not require a Judge and are generally handled by our Referees in Hennepin County. Conciliation includes: Conciliation, Default Judgment, Forfeiture, Housing Court, and Transcript Judgment. There has been a 2.4% decrease in Minor Civil Cases since 1999.

Towards the end of 2003, the legislature increased in the filing fee for new Civil cases and there has been a corresponding decrease in new cases filed.





Clearance rates for Major Civil cases




Clearance Rates for Major Civil Cases: 1999- 2004

Clearance Rates are calculated by dividing the number of cases disposed by the number of new cases. Any amount over 100% means that the court is handling all the new cases and is beginning to work on pending cases as well.



Clearance rates for Minor Civil cases




Clearance Rates for Minor Civil Cases: 1999- 2004

• Average Age of pending cases for Civil




Age of Pending Cases for Major Civil Cases 2002- 2004

State Guidelines suggest that 99% of Major Civil pending cases should be less than 24 months old. Pending cases are those cases that have not yet been disposed.



• Percent Pending for Major Civil cases




Percent Pending for Major Civil Cases: 1999- 2004

The 'Percent Pending' tracks the percent of the cases that are still active at the end of each year. Since the majority of the Major Civil cases are resolved within 24 months, about 1/2 of the them will be pending at the end of each year. There has been a 1.6% decrease in the percent of cases that are pending at the end of the year.



Average Age of Disposed Major Civil Cases



Average Age of Disposed Major Civil Cases in Months: 1999- 2004

Knowing the average age of cases that have been resolved helps courts plan for different types of calendars. There has been a 8% decrease in the length of time (in months) that it takes to resolve Major Civil cases.
