PURPOSE:

The Commission on Judicial Selection solicits, evaluates and makes recommendations to the Governor for vacancies which occur in the District Courts.

MEMBERSHIP: 49 Members:

There are nine-at-large members - 7 of those are appointed by the Governor; 2 appointed by the Supreme Court.

They address all judicial vacancies.

There are four district members representing each of the ten judicial districts - two appointed by the Governor; 2 appointed by the Supreme Court. They serve on the Commission to address a vacancy in their district only.

Therefore, when the Commission meets the total membership present at any given time equals 13.

MEETINGS: As required.

COMPENSATION: No per diem, no expenses.

COMMISSION ON JUDICIAL SELECTION

OUTLINE OF PROCEDURES FOR JUDICIAL APPOINTMENTS

An attorney may become a judge by being elected or appointed. If he or she is appointed by the Governor, that person must run for election beyond one year of the swearing-in date. An elected judge's term is six years.

The Minnesota Constitution directs the Governor to fill all judicial seats that are vacated prior to a judge's elected term being completed. Minnesota State Statute 480B.01 (1990) created the Commission on Judicial Selection (also called the Commission).

The Commission on Judicial Selection solicits, evaluates and makes recommendations to the Governor for vacancies which occur in the District Courts. The Commission is not mandated to make recommendations to the Governor for vacancies which occur in the Appellate Courts.

The procedure the Commission will use in recommending judicial candidates is set forth below:

- I. The Commission shall announce all judicial vacancies as they are certified by the Supreme Court and specify a deadline for application.
 - A. An attorney wishing to apply requests an application by either writing the Chair of the Commission on Judicial Selection at 130 State Capitol, St. Paul, MN 55155, or by calling Jan Gallagher, Director of Judicial Appointments at 296-0015.
 - B. The application is eight pages plus a Demographic Data Sheet. Four additional pages are the authorizations which are used to make confidential inquiries should the applicant become a finalist. These are made with the Department of Revenue, the Bureau of Criminal Apprehension, the Lawyer's Professional Responsibility Board and/or the Board on Judicial Standards, and the Clerk of the Supreme Court. The Demographic Data Sheet is kept separate from the application and should be sent to the Director of Judicial Appointments for statistical purposes.
 - C. Applications and letters of recommendations are kept for two years.
 - D. An applicant must reapply each time a new vacancy is announced in his or her judicial district.
 - E. All judicial applications are confidential.

- II. The Commission shall search out likely candidates for judicial appointment.
 - A. The Commission shall actively seek and encourage qualified individuals, including women and minorities, to apply for judicial offices. (Minnesota State Statute 480B.01, Subd. 7, 1990). The Commission shall evaluate the extent to which candidates have the following qualifications for judicial office: integrity, maturity, health (if job related), judicial temperment, legal knowledge, ability, experience and community service.
 - B. An applicant must be a resident of the judicial district for which she or he applies. There are ten judicial districts made up of the 87 Minnesota counties, as shown on the attached map.
- III. The Commission shall receive and review judicial applications and letters of recommendation written on behalf of those applicants.
 - A. All recommendations for judicial applicants should be made in writing and directed to the Chair.
 - B. Receipt of applications will be acknowledged by the Chair or his/her designee. All letters of recommendation will be made available to the members of the Commission on Judicial Selection.
 - C. The Commission, or a designated subcommittee of the Commission, shall review the applications and letters of recommendation and determine from the written materials which applicants shall be semi-finalists who shall be afforded personal interviews.
- IV. Individual Commission members shall not meet with applicants for the purpose of a telephone or personal interview prior to the actual meeting of the Commission.
 - A. Interviews of the semi-finalists will be conducted on the day of the Commission meeting. The applicants who are selected to interview will meet with the nine at-large members of the Commission and the four district members.
 - B. The members of the Commission include four district members who serve where there is a vacancy in their judicial district, plus the nine at-large members. Membership includes men, women and minorities who offer a wide variety of life experiences.

- C. On the day of the meeting the Commission will:
 - 1. Personally interview candidates.
 - 2. Discuss the education and experience of each applicant.
 - 3. Prepare a list of three to five finalists for each judicial vacancy to be presented to the Governor.
- V. The Commission will publish the list of finalists.

After the confidential inquiries are completed, the Chair of the Commission on Judicial Selection and the Director of Judicial Appointments present the finalists to the Governor. The Governor has the option to personally interview finalists. The Governor may fill the vacancy from the nominees presented by the Commission. If the Governor declines to select a nominee to fill the vacancy from the list of nominees, the Governor may select a person to fill the vacancy without regard to the Commission's recommendation.

VI. No applicant or individual on behalf of or in opposition to any applicant should make direct personal, telephonic or written contact with members of the Commission regarding any judicial application during the period between the announcement of a judicial vacancy and the Governor's announcement of appointment. All inquiries or communication with the Commission should be either in writing or by telephone to the Director of the Commission on Judicial Selection, 130 State Capitol, St. Paul, Minnesota 55155.
