TO: THE SUPREME COURT OF THE STATE OF MINNESOTA:

The Lawyers Professional Responsibility Board hereby petitions the Court to adopt, effective with payments due on and after July 1, 1992, the following amendments to Rule 2, Rules for Registration of Attorneys:

### RULE 2. REGISTRATION FEE

In order to defray the expenses of examinations and investigations for admission to the bar and disciplinary proceedings, over and above the amount paid by applicants for such admission, with exception hereinafter enumerated, each attorney admitted to practice law in this state and those members of the judiciary who are required to be admitted to practice as a prerequisite to holding office shall hereafter annually pay to the clerk of the appellate courts a registration fee in the sum of One-Hundred-Twenty-two Dollars (\$142.00) or in such lesser sum as the court may annually hereafter determine.

Such fee, or portion thereof, shall be paid on or before the first day of January, April, July, or

October of each year as requested by the clerk of the appellate courts.

All sums so received shall be allocated as follows:

\$15.00 to the State Board of Law Examiners \$7.00 to the State Board of Continuing Legal Education

\$80.00 \$100.00 to the Lawyers Professional Responsibility Board

\$20.00 to the Minnesota Client Security Fund.

The following attorneys and judges shall pay an annual registration fee of Thirty-nine-Dollars (\$42.00):

- (a) Any attorney or judge whose permanent residence is outside the State of Minnesota and who does not practice law within the state;
- (b) Any attorney who has not been admitted to practice for more than three years;
- (c) Any attorney while on duty in the armed forces of the United States.

The Thirty-nine-Dellars-(\$39.00) Forty-two

Dollars (\$42.00) so received shall be allocated as follows:

\$15.00 to the State Board of Law Examiners \$7.00 to the State Board of Continuing Legal Education

(\$17.00) (\$20.00) to the Lawyers Professional Responsibility Board.

Any attorney admitted to practice law on or after July 1, 1988, shall pay to the Minnesota Client Security Fund \$50 in the fiscal year of admission and an additional \$50 in the fiscal year the attorney becomes subject to the first paragraph of this rule. This second \$50 shall be instead of any annual assessment in favor of the Client Security Fund in that year.

Any attorney who is retired from any gainful employment or permanently disabled, or who files annually with the clerk of the appellate courts an affidavit that he or she is so retired or disabled and not engaged in the practice of law, shall be placed in a fee-exempt category and shall remain in good standing. An attorney claiming retired or permanently disabled status who subsequently resumes active practice of law shall promptly file notice of such change of status with the clerk of the appellate courts and pay the annual registration fee.

Any judge who is retired from any gainful employment or permanently disabled, who no longer serves on the bench or practices law, and who files annually with the clerk of the appellate courts that he or she is so retired or disabled and not engaged in the practice of law, shall be placed in a fee-exempt category and shall remain in good standing. A judge claiming retired or permanently disabled status who subsequently resumes service on the bench or the active practice of law shall promptly file notice of such

change of status with the clerk of the appellate courts and pay the annual registration fee.

### I. INTRODUCTION

The Lawyers Professional Responsibility Board has filed a petition requesting the Minnesota Supreme Court to increase the portion of the annual registration fee payable to the Lawyers Professional Responsibility Board from \$80.00 to \$100.00 for most attorneys, and to increase the sum for other attorneys from \$17.00 to \$20.00. Since 1985, the fee payable for Lawyers Board services has been increased only once, by \$10.00 in 1988. It is expected that no further fee increases would be necessary for at least four or five years. The need for the fee increase is explained as follows.

The normal annual budgeting process is being accelerated this year, because of the clear need to increase the amount of the annual attorney registration fee for Lawyers Board uses by July 1, 1992. A time line is attached at A. 1.

The normal process of budgeting for a two year period is also being extended this year, to include additional budget projections for two more years. Fee increases should normally be in an amount sufficient so that no additional fee increase will be needed for approximately four years.

The requested fee increase does not include any additional attorneys for the Director's Office. It is occasioned by inflation, increased complaints, expenditures for equipment and expenditures related to an expected move to the Judicial Center, as well as some additional needs for clerical services. The Director's Office has also been providing additional services in recent years, such as the trust account overdraft notice program and services to the Client Security Board. Last year alone there were 55 Supreme Court disciplinary matters (a new record), as well as continuing increases in such services as telephone advisory opinions to practicing lawyers, disciplinary probations, trusteeships for abandoned law practices, etc.

Attached are annual budgets and projections for FY'91 through FY'96 (A. 2-8). Supreme Court administration recommends a fiscal year balance carry forward of at least 20 percent of annual budget. The carry forward on June 30, 1992, will be only 15 percent of budget. With the \$20 annual increase, effective 7/1/92, the balance carry forward on 6/30/96 would be projected to be \$335,347, an amount equal to 20 percent of budget. Because FY'96 projections show expenditures exceeding income, the carry forward would be expected to decline in and after FY'96.

The 1988 annual report of the Board and Director reported on the \$10 increase effective 7/1/88, and projected that "another three to four year interval can transpire without an additional increase." Attached is a chart on Attorney Registration Fee History and Projections (A. 9).

Attached at A. 10-13 is a recent survey, done by the New Jersey Office of Attorney Ethics on attorney license fees in the various states and District of Columbia. It appears that the

discipline fees range widely, from \$395 in California to \$50 or less in Arkansas. A. 13 lists the states, like Minnesota, which have voluntary bar organizations. It appears that the current Minnesota discipline fee of \$80 is about average. New Jersey is presently seeking a \$20 increase.

The main variables, assumptions, methods and conclusions of the budgeting and projecting process are highlighted below. Aside from the intrinsic difficulty of projecting budget several years in advance, the main unknowns are: payroll expense, in light of the current fiscal crisis; timing and expense of moving to the Judicial Center, with related rental, furniture and equipment expenses; and expenses for computerization. Another important item that has turned out to be more variable than expected is the incremental additional number of attorneys paying the full registration fee. This number has grown quite a bit more slowly than previously projected, and a substantially increased fee might greatly affect the number and thereby the main source of income.

### II. INCOME

### 1. Number of Attorneys.

The Lawyers Board and Client Security Board more than the other Supreme Court Boards, depend upon the Supreme Court attorney registration fees. In the past, we have taken an average of several years as a basis for projecting future increases in the number of attorneys. The old historical averages now seem to have been projected higher than our experience in the last couple of years. We have taken reductions in FY'91 and '92 to take account of this. Based on more recent data we are further reducing both the number of attorneys

expected to be paying the fee in FY'92, and the additional number of attorneys expected for FY'93. Of course, these adjustments reduce income.

A cumulative shortfall in number of paying attorneys in FY'90 resulted in registration income falling \$50,154 short of projections. This is reflected both in the balance forward and in the number of attorneys expected to have paid during FY'91. For FY'91, income projections were revised to reflect 200 fewer attorneys paying the \$80 fee and 100 fewer paying the \$17 fee--reducing FY'91 anticipated income by \$17,700. For FY'92 and following, we have reduced from 700 to 500 the net additional number of attorneys for each year.

### 2. Late Fees.

On July 1, 1990, the late fee for attorney registration dues was increased from \$5 to \$50. In FY'91 this generated income of \$73,130, a portion of which benefits our budget. Our budget was credited with \$41,072 as our share of the additional late fees.

Projecting late fees for FY'92 and '93 is difficult with the small historical base for the \$50 amount. We have projected 66 percent of FY'91 late fees and fines--believing that attorneys will learn from expensive experience to pay on time more often.

### III. EXPENDITURES

Payroll accounts for nearly 80 percent of expenditures. Payroll increases for FY'92 are limited to a 2.25 percent COLA plus merit increases of up to 3 percent. However, many employees have reached their salary range maximums and receive no merit increase. Most of these employees receive a "stability payment," equal to about \$500 - \$750.

As the footnotes indicate, FY'95 and FY'96 are projected simply by assuming an overall increase of 8 percent, with an adjustment made for moving expenses. This increase would probably accommodate an additional position at a level of law clerk or clerical person, but would not anticipate an additional legal assistant or lawyer.

Rent is projected at an approximate rate for the Judicial Center, furnished by Supreme Court administration.

### IV. ALTERNATE PROJECTION ASSUMING A \$15 ANNUAL FEE INCREASE

Attached at A. 14-16 are projections showing the estimated incomes and balances forward for FY'93-FY'96, assuming a \$15 fee increase. That amount would be insufficient.

### V. CONCLUSION

An increase of \$20 in the annual registration fee is necessary for the period beginning July 1, 1992. Since there has been only a single, \$10 increase, since October 1984, the amount of the increase by itself should not be unduly burdensome.

The amount of the fee increase appears to be necessary to ensure that further increases are not needed in the short term. A troublesome variable in recent budgeting has been that the number of fee-paying attorneys apparently has not increased as much as had been expected.

For the above reasons, the Lawyers Professional Responsibility Board respectfully requests the Minnesota Supreme

Court to grant its petition for amendment of rules relating to registration of attorneys.
