Cases where the defendant pleads or is found guilty have generally increased from 2005 to about 70% in recent years. Dismissals have stayed constant at about 18%-19% most recently. The interim dispositions, such as continued or diverted, have decreased from 15% in 2005 to about 9% in the last few years.

The criminal bench resolved hundred more felony cases in 2017 than 2016. And, in 2018, this increased even more as a result of adding judges to the felony team. This is the highest number of felony cases resolved in Hennepin County in one year.

The numbers in italics are adjusted averages that are the result of an outlier analysis. Removal of extreme or outlier values presents a truer picture of the average. We present both averages, unadjusted and adjusted for all years.

In September of 2014, the bench began to plan for a combined felony team. One of the first steps was to bring as many judges on board to handle older felony cases (referred to as 'the blitz'). The result was that by the end of the year, we had disposed of 12% more felony cases than the previous year (6,120 compared to 5,458 in 2013). In the first two years of implementation of assignment directly to one of 16 judges for each felony case, we see improvement in the reduced number of days necessary to resolve the case. From a high of 170 days to now 151 days. This will allow for better case management and more rapid resolution of these cases while eliminating non-productive hearings. In 2017, the bench specialized the felony judges into Property/Drug and Serious Felony teams. Timing indicators look even better in 2017 than the previous two years all while handling more cases. Finally, in 2018, keeping the same model of two felony teams, but adding more judges, Hennepin was able to resolve significantly more felony cases with less hearings. Time to Disposition was slightly up from 135 to 142 days.

Overall, the length of time between the offense date and the filing date (the decision to prosecute) for felony cases takes a little over 3 months. Some of the quickest prosecution decisions are in the areas of 'other person' felonies and weapons cases.

After the filing decision, felony cases take anywhere from 4 months to 9 months on average to reach resolution, with the longest being Homicides and Sex Crimes that also have the highest trial rates. The shortest time to disposition are for drug, property felonies and other felonies. These three categories account for 68% of all felonies.

Figure 1. Time to Disposition for Felony Cases




Figure 2. Time to Disposition for Felonies Against Persons





Figure 3. Time to Disposition for Drug, Property and Other Felonies






Figure 4. Percentage of Disposed Felonies that meet Statewide Guidelines

A second method of reviewing the length of time to resolve cases compares state guidelines for felony case processing. This graph shows how our felony cases compare to the 90%, 97%, and 99% state recommendation. For this analysis, we removed bench warrant and complaint warrant time to match the state criteria for these recommendations.

The timing elements in 2017-2018 showed an improved time to resolve felony cases overall under the new case management system of blocking cases directly to judges at early stages of the case.

Non-felony cases take about 4 months to process once the case is filed with the court. Parking cases are disposed of the most quickly, while DWI and other Criminal cases take the longest at slightly over 4 months.

Domestic Assault average 4 hearings per case, while DWIs, Other Criminal cases and Traffic cases average about 3 hearings to reach disposition. On average, Parking cases take a little over 2 hearings to resolve.

Figure 5. Time to Disposition in Days of Non-Felony Cases




Figure 6. Time to Disposition of Non-Felony Cases by Case Type




Figure 7: Time to Disposition by Division



There is a difference of about a month, on average, to process non-felony cases between our different divisions: Brookdale processes cases in about 3 ½ months, Downtown is close to 4 months and the other divisions are closer to 5 months.

All four divisions average about three hearings to resolve all their cases.

In 2018, about 93% of all payable citations close with a guilty plea (citizens paid their fines). Diversions occur in about 1% of the citations although the Hearing Office does dispose of about 9% of the cases with diversions. Overall, dismissal occur in about 6% of the payable citations. The Hearing Office dismisses about 22% of the cases before them. The vast majority of payable citations dispose (86%) without a hearing.

Cases in 2018 are averaging about 2 days from Offense to Court Acceptance and about 41 days to resolution.

*After conversion in 2016, Hennepin County reviewed very old converted payable cases from our citation database ViBES. Particularly in 2017, we sent cases that were more than 5 years old to city prosecutors to assess the likelihood of disposition of the case. As a result, 63,512 cases filed between 2003 and 2011 end up being disposed. We still have a number of very old payable cases (2012-2016).

An additional clean up included cases that had no identifying defendant name on the citation but show up in the system as "MNCIS PARKING". Some of these were extraordinarily old as well. In this situation, with no defendant name, we have no opportunity to dispose of the case. These are situations where the car that for which a ticket is written is not registered in MN. With no identifying information to be sent from the Department of Public Safety, we were unable to collect the fine. There were 67,834 of these cases dismissed by our Chief Judge because we are unable to collect the money.

The vast majority of payable cases disposed each year are petty misdemeanors (89%) while another 11% are at the misdemeanor level.

The average number of days from offense date to court acceptance is 2 for common misdemeanors and 4 for petty misdemeanors.

To reach resolution, common misdemeanors take less than 2 months and petty misdemeanors take about 1 ½ months.
