The Court has forms and instructions, for some types of cases, as a general guide to the court process. Form

Application for Ex Parte Order Regarding Children's Passports (FAM1002)

Forms are available online at www.mncourts.gov/forms.

There are certain documents that parents must provide when applying for a passport for their child. One of these documents is an original or certified copy of the child's birth certificate. When a father's name is listed on the child's birth certificate, the federal government requires both parents to sign or give written consent before issuing a passport for that child.

There are some exceptions when the consent of both parents is not required. Under Minnesota law, a biological mother of a child born to a mother who was not married to the child's father when the child was born or conceived has sole custody of the child until there is a court order that establishes custodial rights of the child's father. This means the father named on the birth certificate has no rights to custody of the child until there is a court order granting custody rights to the father, and the biological mother has sole legal custody. If there is no court order granting sole legal custody to one parent and no custody action is pending before the court, the biological mother who has sole legal custody by law may request the court to issue an order that authorizes her to apply for a passport for her child without needing the consent of the other parent.

You cannot use these forms if there is a court order granting custody of the child to you or any other person.

Do you have more than one child?

You can use this form for multiple children *as long as the children have the same father*. If the children have different fathers, then you will need to use separate forms.

The judge will need information about you and your children. It is important to give complete and accurate information regarding the birth of your children, where you and your children live, and how long your children have lived at the current address, and whether there are any other court orders or cases about custody of the children.



Signature Block

Sign the Application for Ex Parte OrderRegarding Children's Passports form, and print your_name, address, phone number, and e-mail address in the blanks under the signature line. When you sign the form, you are signing under *penalty of perjury*. This means you are saying that everything in the form is true and correct; if you know something in the form is not true when you sign it, you could be found guilty of the crime of perjury (see Minn. Stat. § 609.48, https://www.revisor.mn.gov/statutes/?id=609.48).

Step 2

File the Application for Ex Parte Order Regarding Children's Passports with Court
Administration (FAM1002)

File the *Application* with Court Administration in the county where the children live. There will be a filing fee (see https://mncourts.gov/Help-Topics/Court-Fees.aspx, or contact Court Administration). If you cannot afford the filing fee, you may ask the court to reduce or waive the filing fee. For more information, see https://mncourts.gov/Help-Topics/Fee-Waiver-IFP.aspx.

What to Expect Next...

It will be up to the judicial officer whether to hold a hearing on your application, whether to grant your request without a hearing, or whether to deny your request. If a hearing is scheduled, you need to appear and bring your documents with you.

If the judicial officer decides that a hearing is needed, court administration will send out a notice letting you know the date and time of any hearing in your case. Be sure to keep the court updated with any address or telephone number change.
