DWI COURT PROGRAM MISSION: To increase public safety and reduce the number of alcohol related traffic deaths and injuries by effectively partnering the justice system and community resources to focus on the specific issues of repeat DWI offenders. From 2007 to 2018, 686 participants were accepted into DWI Court.

2018 PARTICIPANT SURVEY

93% of participants agreed they would recommend DWI Court to a friend in a similar situation.

“I feel like the court is really designed to help me rather than throw me in jail [and that] they care about you as a person and care about your sobriety and are not just doing a job.”

“I’m an intergenerational alcoholic. I realized it’s time to stop. My kids are adults and I didn’t want them to see me die a drunk.”
